Priorities

- To provide a stable foundation that best assists students to prepare for their futures as well-adjusted, contributing citizens.
 - To support the continued commitment of staff to engage in reflective practice, continuous improvement and collaborative decision-making.
 - Through the use of Direct Instruction, to create structured learning environments where our students are safe, challenged, and supported with differentiated programming through grouping students according to their level.
 - To ensure successful student learning of the outcomes in the Program of Studies and in particular, to ensure that students develop strong reading and understanding skills through the direct-instruction based Reading Mastery Program.
 - To meet the educational needs of all students, including second-language learners
 - To focus on rural leadership development for all students, including public speaking, school-led leadership opportunities, leadership programs, civic leadership and service-learning opportunities.
 - To provide for a varied and broad-based program, including locally structured electives, leadership opportunities, effective French second language and the development of a "Vision for Technology" to meet needs of students in the digital age.
 - To enhance parental partnerships and successfully engage families and the community
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Accomplishments

- Continued development of in-house second language programming with focus change to French only
- Substantial improvement in Provincial Achievement test results
- Continued and expanded communication home regarding curriculum details and progress in all aspects of our programming.
- Successive years of high enrollment in Kindergarten and Cycle One of Elementary grades, pointing to a healthy future.
- Continued with expanded leadership program including rotating student council (all junior high students now have opportunity to experience membership and work in Student Council) and increased leadership/citizenship instruction and practice in all grades
 - includes student planned, led and performed productions: Remembrance Day, Christmas, Spring Sing Talent Show, etc.
 - service program partnering young student with older students for shared activities and help, for example paired reading, shared lunches, etc.
 - Student Council planned and implemented programs such as School Spirit Days, in-school fundraisers, celebration activities

- Continued Enhanced Learning Opportunity class for all Junior High students; 30 minutes daily of teacher supervised time to learn and practice study skills and work on homework assignments
- Continued junior high Study, Knowledge, Initiative and Life-long Learning (SKILL) Program to provide increased support to struggling students
- Partnership with FCSS and AHS for student support services
- Developing partnership with local provider for dyslexia support services
- Increased parental involvement in school life
 - continued active School Council
 - registration process continued to ensure accurate, timely student registration
 - implementation of documentation and processes to be more intentional and to strengthen parent-school partnership
 - implementation of program to increase participation in School Council
 - classroom assignments requiring all classes from grade 3-9 to attend one School Council meeting per year with a parent (as per charter requirement)
 - goals: meet charter requirement for students to experience a community style meeting each year, increase parent involvement and participation at School Council
- Highly successful grade 8-9 field trip to Ottawa, Montreal and Quebec City for curricular and leadership opportunities
- Ongoing and increasing collaboration with area schools
- Completion of substantial playground project in partnership with community
- Successful completion (by School Council) of fundraising efforts to purchase new sound and audio-visual system for gymnasium
- Hosted Missoula Theatre drama week long clinic for students ... cost met by school fundraising efforts

Engaging Parents and the Community

The administration of Valhalla Community School has ensured that School Council is apprised of and offered the opportunity to provide input and give feedback on the results of the Accountability Pillar surveys, the Annual Education Plan and the Annual Educational Results Report. This feedback is considered in the final draft of the AERR, as well as in the development of current and future Annual Education Plans.

The Valhalla Heritage Society is the owner of the building in which the school is housed. The Society is a true community partner, and has invested strongly in improving the building and adding to the facility space with a view to the priorities and needs of the school as well as the community. The building also houses the public library and meetings involving the School Board, Library and Society have improved communication between the three organizations

Successful Initiatives for 2015-2016:

- All students and their parents, grade 3 and up by grade level, participated in one School Council meeting at the school
- Communicated with the larger community via articles in the local newspaper about charter schools and about VCS.
- Continued development of registration process which welcomes parents into the school to participate in a more community-based information session with interview and commitment procedures for new families registering at the school.
- Teachers provide monthly curriculum and program updates
- Improved communication and shared decision-making with Valhalla Heritage Society
- Participation in community events including Communities in Bloom and Canada Day parade.

Our Charter Goals are to produce students who are excellent communicators and to prepare students for community involvement and leadership,

Highlights and Challenges

There is very strong parent and teacher satisfaction with the ability of students to communicate, their progress in second language, and their improvement in basic skills. Our public speaking program is meeting with satisfaction and our efforts to engage parents are also satisfactory but we feel these areas can be continually improved. Our PAT results have been improving and our results this year were very satisfactory. We believe that a continuously improved community atmosphere in the school, efforts to engage parents, and a strong focus on peer coaching and student engagement in teacher professional development are having a positive impact on our results..

The Provincial Goals are that every student is successful, that Alberta has excellent teaching and school leadership, that Alberta's education system is governed effectively, that it is inclusive, and that First Nations, Métis and Inuit students are successful.

Highlights and Challenges

There is strong satisfaction that students model characteristics of active citizenship and attitudes that will benefit them in their work and education. A very high percentage of our students go on to finish high school. There is also strong satisfaction that students are in a safe and caring learning environment, that they are respectful, that parents have every opportunity to be involved in the education of their children, and with the quality of education. Our academic results have also improved over the past two years, with excellent results in the 2016 PAT results. Our challenges are to maintain strong academic results, and continue to maintain strong registration numbers at the lower grades and have a stable and strong student population through junior high. **parents."**
